Ingenious square combinations for 2 to 4 far-sighted players.

You need an eye here for what's important. The winner is the person who forms the most squares with his pegs. It sounds easier than it actually is because you so often overlook the most obvious solution. The game for people with strategic skills and a mind for an unusual eye view!

Object of the game

The object of the game is for each player to form as many squares as possible with his pegs. The winner is the player with the most squares.

Setting up the game

Each player takes twelve pegs of the same colour. The board is set in the middle of the table in view of all players. The winning points are placed beside the board within reach.

Playing the game

The youngest player starts and places one of his pegs on any free field. The next player takes his turn. Players take turns and the object of the game is to form as many squares with four pegs of the same colour.

An opposing square can of course prevent this. The player wins a winning point for every square formed. Squares can be formed horizontally, diagonally and rotated (**Figure 1**). The size of the squares is unimportant.

If several squares are completed when a peg is placed on the board, the player wins one winning point for every square formed (**Figure 2 and 3**).
